If we are serious about realizing the full potential of all children, we cannot tolerate that. That's why I am happy to announce you that in a few months' time VVOB will, together with several partners, launch a new Open Resource on Gender Responsive Pedagogy for TVET. The Resource will provide examples of good practice of gender-responsive pedagogy (GRP) from around the world and demonstrate how TVET can promote gender equity and equality in practical terms.
